MATTHEW 16:13-20 - DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

WHAT IS THE CHURCH? - (SERMON MP3)

In (Matthew 16:13-20) we learn that Christ will build his church, and he'll use disciples to do it as they proclaim the gospel message. His building project cannot fail.

- Christ is passionate about his church. Do you share his heartbeat? In your experience, who has been an example of what a passionate life investment into the church looks like? Share how they've impacted you with the group.
- Christ will use disciples in the building project who know who he is, and are willing to follow him. Who is Jesus to you? Are you really following him?
- The church will be built by the spread of the gospel. Are you a witness for Christ? Are you opening the doors of heaven through the proclamation of the good news? List two people that you want to share the gospel with, and ask your group to pray for opportunities with you.
- The church's ultimate success is guaranteed. The score is set and the victory has already been won. If you believe that, will you invest? See if you can find some Biblical examples of people who invested in the church. What did they do? What can you do?

The church was not the invention of man. What are some of the greatest obstacles people face when contemplating loving the church? What holds some people back from pouring themselves into the body of Christ?
